Address & Notifications

- Update mailing address at USPS. com (first-class mail is forwarded for 12 months).
- Change address with banks, insurance, DMV, voter registration, and subscription services.
- Notify friends, family, and professional organizations.
- Check HOA or condo board for moving restrictions.

Utilities & Home Services

- Transfer or cancel electricity, water, gas, internet, cable, and trash pickup.
- Arrange service setup at the new home.
- Settle any final bills or refunds.

Packing & Organization

- Declutter by donating or selling unnecessary items.
- Label boxes clearly by room.
- Take photos of electronic setups before disconnecting.
- Secure important documents (IDs, financial records, legal papers).
- Unplug, clean, and disassemble appliances.

Moving Day Essentials

- Pack a small "Open First" box with:
- Toiletries, toilet paper, trash bags
- Chargers, scissors, basic tools
- Snacks, water, paper goods
- Change of clothes and medications
- Keep important documents, keys, phone, and wallet easily accessible.

Long-Distance Moves

- Collect medical, school, and veterinary records.
- Email travel plans to a trusted contact
- Arrange transport for pets and plants.
- Empty your safe deposit box.

Final Checks

- Confirm moving truck and helpers.
- Check parking restrictions for the moving truck.
- Do a final walkthrough to ensure nothing is left behind.
- Lock up and turn off all lights, water, and appliances.

Packing LIKE A PRO!

Plan & Prepare

- Create a master to-do list to track tasks, estimate costs, and avoid last-minute stress.
- Sort and discard unwanted items into "sell," "donate," and "recycle" piles.
- Pack similar items together for easier unpacking.
- Keep essentials like valuables, photos, and must-haves with you.
- Pack a moving day bag with snacks, a first-aid kit, and necessities.

Packing Smart

- Confirm what movers won't take (plants, liquids, etc.).
- Use small boxes for heavy items and keep weight under 50 pounds.
- Avoid overpacking boxes to prevent breakage.
- Wrap fragile items individually and pad boxes with bubble wrap.
- Secure plants in ventilated boxes.

Label & Organize

- Label all sides of each box and use a colorcoded system by room.
- Keep moving documents handy, including contact details, truck info, and receipts.
- Print maps and directions for movers with your contact info.
- Back up important computer files to the cloud or an external hard drive.

Arrival & Inspection

- Check each box and piece of furniture as it arrives.
- Know the moving company's damage reporting process in advance.



Moving with Furry Friends

Before the Move

- Update your pet's ID tag with your new address, mobile number, and email.
- Ensure their collar is sturdy and properly fitted.
- Request veterinary records and transfer them to your new vet.
- Keep your current vet's contact info handy in case of emergency.
- Refill prescriptions and pack a week's worth of food and medication.
- Introduce your pet to their travel crate in advance.

Moving Day

- Seclude pets in a quiet, safe room with a sign on the door.
- Use a well-ventilated, sturdy crate for transport.
- Prepare a pet first aid kit with:
 - Vet's contact info.
 - Gauze, adhesive tape, nonstick bandages.
 - Towels, cotton swabs, antibiotic ointment (without pain relief).
 - 3% hydrogen peroxide (for emergency use).

Traveling with Pets

- Secure pets in a crate or carrier fastened with a seat belt.
- Never leave pets in a moving van, truck bed, or parked car.
- Find pet-friendly lodging in advance for overnight stays.
- Bring necessary supplies: kitty litter, waste bags, and extra food.

Flying with Pets

- Check airline requirements for pet travel and approved carriers.
- Confirm if a special airline crate is needed for cabin travel.

Settling into Your New Home

- Set up a dedicated space with food, water, bedding, toys, and a litter box.
- Keep windows and doors closed when pets are unsupervised.
- Check for small spaces where anxious pets might hide.
- Alert new homeowners or neighbors if your pet may try to return to your old home.

Additional Considerations

- Learn about local pet laws, licensing, and veterinary care in your new area.
- For international moves, check quarantine rules and required documentation.
